Re: Notifications to Public Water Systems Regarding Drought Contingency Plans

**Dear County Extension Agent:** 

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has sent a letter to public water systems statewide reminding them of TCEQ's encouragement for implementing their drought contingency plans due to continuing widespread drought conditions. Even though portions of Texas have experienced recent rain events, drought conditions persist and thus the TCEQ is also strongly encouraging systems statewide that have enacted some form of their drought contingency plan to continue to implement these restrictions. A copy of this letter is enclosed for your reference.

Multiple program areas at the TCEQ are actively engaged in the oversight of available water supplies statewide, and are working with municipalities that face potential shortfalls of available drinking water. With no immediate relief forecasted, the TCEQ is soliciting your help in disseminating appropriate information to affected parties in your communities. Should the drought cycle worsen as expected, keeping residents well informed will be very important.
