Requested action:

The resolution is submitted to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (commission) to consider approval to fill 17 of the 41 positions on the Galveston Bay Council (GBC).

Galveston Bay Council Membership Background:

The GBC is a 41-member advisory body to the commission whose function is to advise the commission on the implementation of *The Galveston Bay Plan*, the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP) for Galveston Bay. The GBC was created by resolution of the commission on November 21, 1995, and expires November 15, 2035. Members serve four-year terms. The terms are staggered such that approximately half of the terms expire at the same time. Two new members were appointed by their specific entity for vacancies due to job changes or retirements. Two new members were nominated by the GBC to fill the Large Local Governments (population >500,000) and Small Local Governments (population < 25,000) vacancies due to a retirement and a job change, respectively.

The GBC helps guide implementation of the CCMP first published in 1995 and revised in 2018 with a second edition.

Galveston Bay Council composition:

The CCMP, and subsequently the original resolution creating the GBC in 1995, lists 41 entities to represent diverse areas of interest in accordance with federal Clean Water Act (CWA), §320. Membership positions are grouped into two categories:

Category 1 Named entities: State and federal agencies; regional entities; and other

named entities identified in the CCMP, due to the direct impact the organization or function has on the bay (e.g., San Jacinto River Authority, Galveston Bay Foundation) or because that organization represents a coalition of members with a specific interest relevant to the bay (e.g., East Harris County Manufacturer's Association, Greater Houston Partnership,

League of Women Voters).

Category 2 Named interests: Positions representing a specific interest or group that

provides balance and diversity (e.g., commercial fisheries, small local

government).

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Nomination process:

Nominations for the 11 positions falling under Category 1, named entities, are made by the executive director of that respective agency or entity, or his/her delegate. If a vacancy exists under Category 1, the representative nominated by that respective entity may begin serving prior to confirmation by the commission. Category 1 nominees are presented in regular font in Attachment A.

Nominations for the 6 positions falling under Category 2, named interests, are solicited and reviewed by the GBC Nominations Subcommittee. Nominations are open and are taken from GBC members at large, partners actively involved in bay-related activities, and County Judges in the surrounding counties as appropriate. Nominations are based on relevant expertise, experience, capacity to represent a specific group or interest, and willingness to serve. Category 2 nominees cannot begin serving until approved by the commission. Category 2 nominees are in *italic font* in Attachment A.

Nominations are vetted through the Nominations Subcommittee and submitted to the GBC to determine which nominees will be recommended to the commission for consideration.

Nominees are listed in Attachment A. Attachment B provides biographical information on the nominees in both categories. Of the 17 nominees, 4 are new.

Under what authority are we taking this action?

The commission is authorized to establish and maintain advisory committees under Texas Water Code (TWC), §5.107. Additionally, the commission is charged with implementing the CCMP as outlined in the Texas Estuaries Act, Senate Bill 708, 76th Texas Legislature (1999), under TWC, §§5.601 - 5.609.

The CCMP directs that the GBC be representative of federal, state, and local natural resource agencies; the research community; local government; the private sector, including representatives from nature tourism; citizen groups, including representatives from underrepresented communities; and other Galveston Bay stakeholders.

Membership is consistent with Texas Government Code, Chapter 2110, State Agency Advisory Committees, and with the approved CCMP. Membership also conforms to requirements of the federal CWA, §320 by including representatives from specified groups and organizations.

Is this resolution required by federal rule or state statute? Which ones?

The resolution is not required by federal rule or state statute; however, it implements the CCMP specifically, the sections governing plan implementation and the role and make-up of the GBC.

What issue(s) or problem(s) are we trying to solve?

The commission is charged with implementing the CCMP. The CCMP calls for the creation of the GBC to guide implementation. Maintaining appropriate membership on the GBC

ensures compliance of the CCMP and facilitates effective comprehensive management of Galveston Bay.

Will there be a fiscal impact? If so, estimate.

Federal funding for the GBEP and the CCMP, under the federal CWA, §320, could be jeopardized if GBC membership is not inclusive of representatives identified in the federal CWA, §320. The GBEP grant amount can fluctuate each fiscal year, however for fiscal year 2023, the federal amount awarded was approximately \$750,000.

Charrish Stevens Representing National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS)

Education/Certifications: Texas A&M University at Galveston, B.S., Marine Biology and Biological Oceanography

Experience/Responsibilities: Ms. Stevens currently serves as a Fisheries Biologist at NOAA's NMFS Habitat Conservation Division. She has over 14 years of experience working in the government sector as a Fish and Wildlife Biologist for United States (U.S.) Fish and Wildlife Service and now as a Fisheries Biologist for NOAA NMFS managing natural resources in freshwater and marine ecosystems. Her job responsibilities include: preservation, conservation, and restoration of Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) along the Texas Coast by way of U.S. Army Corp of Engineers (USACE) permit reviews or early consultation with partners and stakeholders, EFH Consultation for various projects, freshwater mussel conservation, listing and recovery work with federally listed species, designing and implementing long-term monitoring sites within river systems for species of concern, providing conservation comments and recommendations for USACE permit issuance, conducting natural resource damage assessments during oil spills, and assisting with wetland and marsh restoration projects with various state and private partners.

Education/Certifications: Stephen F. Austin State University, B.S., Forestry

Experience/Responsibilities: Mr. Alford currently serves as a conservation specialist for NRCS with expertise in forestry and coastal habitat restoration. He assists in developing cultivation and restoration technology that will be implemented in a variety of habitat restoration projects along the Texas coast. Mr. Alford works with partners to help grow plant species that are needed for varying habitat restoration projects. He is a member of the Interagency Coordination Team for the Houston Ship Channel and the Beneficial Uses of Dredge Material Work Group for Port Houston.

Program Involvement: Appointed by NRCS in 2008 and nominated to continue representing USDA NRCS. Mr. Alford currently serves as the Vice-Chair for the Natural Resources Uses subcommittee.

Michael T. Lee Representing the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS)

Education/Certifications: Texas A&M University at Galveston, B.S., Marine Sciences; Texas A&M University, M.S., Oceanography

Experience/Responsibilities: Mr. Lee currently serves as the Gulf Coast Branch Chief at the USGS Oklahoma-Texas Water Science Center (OK/TXWSC). In this role, Mr. Lee coordinates and facilitates the scientific, technical, and administrative direction of all operations in the branch including those carried on in cooperation with local, state, and other federal agencies. He conducts research and other scientific/technical work related to water resources development and conservation and ensures that scientific activities meet the needs of the federal government, the OK/TXWSC, cooperating state and local agencies, and the general public. His technical background is in hydrologic research and data collection including water resource, water quality, and environmental/ecological monitoring; utilizing real-time systems, networks, and innovative technology for developing monitoring solutions for hydrologic research. The USGS is a worldwide leader in research of the natural world and serves as the research arm of the U.S. Department of Interior. He has been a Hydrologist for the USGS since 2007, previously working as a research scientist at National Aeronautics and Space Administration and serving as an officer in the USCG.

Program Involvement: Appointed by USGS in 2013 and nominated to continue representing USGS. Mr. Lee currently serves as the Vice-Chair for the Monitoring and Research (M&R) subcommittee.

Lori Hamilton Representing the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ)

Education/Certifications: Stephen F. Austin State University, B.S., Environmental Science; M.S., Environmental Science

Experience/Responsibilities: Ms. Hamilton currently serves as the Deputy Director of TCEQ's Water Quality Planning Division (Division). The Division preserves and improves the quality of the state's surface waters by establishing water quality standards; monitoring, assessing, and reporting conditions; and implementing plans to reduce pollution and improve water quality. She has approximately 18 years of experience at TCEQ and has worked in various areas at the agency, including Water Rights Permitting, Water Quality Standards, 401 Water Quality Certification, and the Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Program. Prior to her role as Deputy Director, she served as the Manager for the Water Rights Permitting and Availability Section in TCEQ's Water Availability Division. Ms. Hamilton also previously worked as the Operation Division Manager for a river authority managing wastewater treatment facilities and drinking water facilities as well as working with the Clean Rivers Program.

He has been employed by TDSHS, formerly Texas Department of Health, for 46 years.

Program Involvement: Appointed in 1995 and nominated to continue representing TDSHS. Mr. Wiles also participates on the M&R and Water and Sediment Quality (WSQ) subcommittees. He was previously involved in the Scientific and Technical Advisory Committee during the *Galveston Bay Plan* development (1990-1994).

Dianna Ramirez* Representing the Texas General Land Office (GLO)

Experience/Responsibilities: Ms. Ramirez currently serves as the Regional Manager of Coastal Field Operations for the Upper Coast Field Office of the Texas GLO, located in LaPorte, TX. She oversees a team that manages the state-owned submerged lands of Texas located within the Upper Coast of Texas. Ms. Ramirez joined the GLO in 2010, serving as a biologist prior to becoming the Regional Manager.

Program Involvement: Appointed in 2023 to represent GLO.

Winfred T. Colbert Representing the City of Houston

Education/Certifications: Yale University, B.A., Political Science; Columbia University Law School, J.D., Certificate of Achievement in International Law; Member, State Bar of Texas

Experience/Responsibilities: Mr. Colbert currently serves as Senior Assistant City Attorney for the City of Houston. His responsibilities are focused on environmental matters. Mr. Colbert is a broadly experienced attorney, mediator, and arbitrator whose legal experience has encompassed all areas of environmental health and safety law and regulation, corporate and business counseling, and governmental/regulatory relations. In addition to providing regulatory, transactional, and general corporate legal services, Mr. Colbert has extensive litigation management and business continuity and crisis management experience. He has counseled and supported business operations in the U.S., Europe, Middle East, Latin America, and Asia/Pacific

regions. Mr. Colbert has served in the following civic and professional capacities: Chairman of the North Texas Clean Air Coalition; Vice-Chairman of the State of Texas Clean Air Responsibility Enterprise Committee; Chairman National Bar Association Energy and Environmental Law Section; Member, American Bar Association Coordinating Group on Energy Law; Member, Greater Houston Partnership Clean Air Committee; Member, Houston Bar Association Environmental Law Section Board of Directors; Member, City of Fort Worth Environmental Advisory Committee; Member, State Bar of Texas Environmental and Natural Resources Section Executive Committee.

Program Involvement: Appointed by the City of Houston in 2019 and nominated to continue representing the City of Houston.

Elizabeth Fazio Hale Representing the Gulf Coast Authority (GCA)

Education/Certifications: University of Texas, B.A., Government, B.S., Communications; University of Denver Sturm College of Law, J.D., LL.M. in Taxation

Experience/Responsibilities: Ms. Fazio Hale currently serves as the CEO/General Manager of GCA. Appointed in 2020, Ms. Fazio Hale oversees the treatment of 50 million gallons per day of wastewater at five facilities, four located in the Galveston Bay area and one in Odessa, Texas. Ms. Fazio Hale is focused on the implementation of the GCA's five-year Strategic Plan, including the betterment of GCA's people and business practices, development of GCA facilities, strengthening of relationships and partnerships, leadership in conduit financial services, and engagement with stakeholders.

Ms. Fazio Hale served as the Director of Natural Resources in the Texas House of Representatives under Chairman Allan Ritter. There, she played an instrumental leadership role in the development of the state water infrastructure fund and revenue fund for Texas (SWIFT/SWIRFT). She also worked on the prioritization and enactment of numerous financial, legal, environmental, conservation, and special district measures during her tenure with the legislature from 2001–2015. Ms. Fazio Hale serves on the Board of Directors for the Texas Water Foundation, the Texas Water Conservation Association (TWCA), TWCA Risk Management Fund, and Economic Alliance Houston Port Region; as Vice President of the Gulf Coast Industrial Development Authority; and Treasurer of the Texas Conservation Fund.

Program Involvement: Appointed by GCA in 2020 and nominated to continue representing GCA. Ms. Fazio Hale worked on direct awards programming for GBEP.

Todd Running* Representing the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC)

Education/Certifications: University of Wisconsin – Eau Claire, B.S., Physical Geography; Houston Baptist University, Management Certificate; National Stormwater Center, Certified Stormwater Inspector.

Experience/Responsibilities: Mr. Running currently serves as the Water Resources Manager in Community and Environmental Planning at H-GAC and has served in this position since 2009. He joined H-GAC in May 1992 and has served in several positions such as Environmental Planner, Senior Environmental Planner, and Clean Rivers Program Manager. He has overseen the development of seven approved Watershed Protection Plans and eight separate Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Projects, including the formation of the Bacteria Implementation Group. Requested action:

The resolution is submitted to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (commission) to consider approval to fill 18 of the 41 positions on the Galveston Bay Council (GBC).

Galveston Bay Council Membership Background:

The GBC is a 41-member advisory body to the commission whose function is to advise the commission on the implementation of *The Galveston Bay Plan*, the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP) for Galveston Bay. The GBC was created by resolution of the commission on November 21, 1995 and expires November 15, 2035. Members serve four-year terms. The terms are staggered such that approximately half of the terms expire at the same time. Two new members were appointed by their specific entity for vacancies due to job changes or retirements. Two new members were nominated by the GBC to fill the Large Local Governments (population >500,000) and Small Local Governments (population < 25,000) vacancies due to a retirement and a job change, respectively.

The GBC helps guide implementation of the CCMP first published in 1995 and revised in 2018 with a second edition.

Galveston Bay Council composition:

The CCMP, and subsequently the original resolution creating the GBC in 1995, lists 41 entities to represent diverse areas of interest in accordance with federal Clean Water Act (CWA), §320. Membership positions are grouped into two categories:

Category 1 Named entities: State and federal agencies; regional entities; and other

named entities identified in the CCMP, due to the direct impact the organization or function has on the bay (e.g., San Jacinto River Authority, Galveston Bay Foundation) or because that organization represents a coalition of members with a specific interest relevant to the bay (e.g., East Harris County Manufacturer's Association, Greater Houston Partnership,

League of Women Voters).

Category 2 Named interests: Positions representing a specific interest or group that

provides balance and diversity (e.g., commercial fisheries, small local

government).

Nomination process:

Nominations for the 12 positions falling under Category 1, named entities, are made by the executive director of that respective agency or entity, or his/her delegate. If a vacancy exists under Category 1, the representative nominated by that respective entity may begin serving prior to confirmation by the commission. Category 1 nominees are presented in regular font in Attachment A.

Nominations for the 6 positions falling under Category 2, named interests, are solicited and reviewed by the GBC Nominations Subcommittee. Nominations are open and are taken from GBC members at large, partners actively involved in bay-related activities, and County Judges in the surrounding counties as appropriate. Nominations are based on relevant expertise, experience, capacity to represent a specific group or interest, and willingness to serve. Category 2 nominees cannot begin serving until approved by the commission. Category 2 nominees are in *italic font* in Attachment A.

Nominations are vetted through the Nominations Subcommittee and submitted to the GBC to determine which nominees will be recommended to the commission for consideration.

Nominees are listed in Attachment A. Attachment B provides biographical information on the nominees in both categories. Of the 18 nominees, 4 are new.

Under what authority are we taking this action?

The commission is authorized to establish and maintain advisory committees under Texas Water Code (TWC), §5.107. Additionally, the commission is charged with implementing the CCMP as outlined in the Texas Estuaries Act, Senate Bill 708, 76th Texas Legislature (1999), under TWC, §§5.601 - 5.609.

The CCMP directs that the GBC be representative of federal, state, and local natural resource agencies; the research community; local government; the private sector, including representatives from nature tourism; citizen groups, including representatives from underrepresented communities; and other Galveston Bay stakeholders.

Membership is consistent with Texas Government Code, Chapter 2110, State Agency Advisory Committees, and with the approved CCMP. Membership also conforms to requirements of the federal CWA, §320 by including representatives from specified groups and organizations.

Is this resolution required by federal rule or state statute? Which ones?

The resolution is not required by federal rule or state statute; however, it implements the CCMP specifically, the sections governing plan implementation and the role and make-up of the GBC.

What issue(s) or problem(s) are we trying to solve?

The commission is charged with implementing the CCMP. The CCMP calls for the creation of the GBC to guide implementation. Maintaining appropriate membership on the GBC

ensures compliance of the CCMP and facilitates effective comprehensive management of Galveston Bay.

Will there be a fiscal impact? If so, estimate.

Federal funding for the GBEP and the CCMP, under the federal CWA, §320, could be jeopardized if GBC membership is not inclusive of representatives identified in the federal CWA, §320. The GBEP grant amount can fluctuate each fiscal year, however for fiscal year 2023, the federal amount awarded was approximately \$750,000.

WHEREAS, the Texas Water Code identifies the commission as the lead state agency for the implementation of *The Galveston Bay Plan*, the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP) developed under the National Estuary Program; and

WHEREAS, the CCMP specifies 41 GBC members from various entities be appointed to acquire the range of expertise and interest needed for effective comprehensive management; and

WHEREAS, the CCMP directs that the GBC be representative of federal, state, and local natural resource agencies; the research community; local government; the private sector, including representatives from nature tourism; citizen groups, including representatives from underrepresented communities; and other Galveston Bay stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, the commission appoints nominees for four-year terms, whose experience, expertise, and commitment will promote the implementation of *The Galveston Bay Plan*; and

WHEREAS, the membership of the GBC conforms with the requirements of §320 of the Federal Clean Water Act (the Act), by including representatives from the groups and organizations specified in the Act; and

WHEREAS, the 41 members of the GBC were originally appointed by the commission by Order of Resolution on November 21, 1995; and

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2023, 18 of the 41 positions are to be filled by the persons listed in Attachment A.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TEXAS COMMISSION ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY that those persons listed in Attachment A are approved with their terms expiring as noted in that attachment.
