This is to give notice that the HUD under part 50 has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988, in ac-cordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Manage-ment and Wetlands Protection. The activi-ty is funded under Section 221(d)(d) of the National Housing Act. The proposed HUD insured Project is located at South-eastern Corner of South Hausman Road and Champion Gate within a residential area of San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas. The subject property consists of 9.4-acres of collateral land occupied by a residence and outbuildings and approxi-mately one acre of a non-collateral ease-ment owned by the City of San Antonio. This is to give notice that the HUD under part 50 has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 in ac

The proposed development will consist of a multi-family apartment complex with four three-story, garden style residential buildings containing a total of 169 units, a clubhouse, leasing offices, landscaped courtyards, a dog park, a resort-style swimming pool, outdoor kitchens, grilling stations, perimeter fencing, and parking. The non-collateral subject property area is proposed for the installation of a storm drain outlet and eight-inch sever line to serve the multi-family residential complex.

According to FEMA FIRM Community Panel Number 48029C0220G, dated September 29, 2010, the proposed collateral property, storm drain outlet, and northern portion of the northern sewer line appear to be located in Zone X, an area located outside of the 100-year and 500-year floodplains also referred to as an area of minimal flood hazards. The southern portion of the proposed sewer line appears to be located within Flood Zone AE, which is an area subject to a 1-percent annual chance of flooding, also referred to as the 100-year floodplain and Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA). The base flood elevation of Zone AE is bebase flood elevation of Zone AE is be-tween 918 and 920 feet.

A Letter of Map Revision dated May 16 2013, partially decreased a portion of the AE Zone to Flood Zone X in the area of the proposed sewer line. However, approx-imately 476-linear feet of the proposed eight-inch sanitary sewer line remains within the SFHA. The total limits of dis-turbance within the SFHA consist of ap-proximately 0.18-acres.

The activities associated with utility line installation include the removal of vegeta tion, use of heavy machinery within the limits of disturbance, and backfilling the trench. Following construction activities, the 0.18 acres of the sewer line easement within the SFHA will require occasional maintenance and vegetative management potentially involving mowing. Stormwater flow patterns and storage capabilities could be affected by the

proposed floodplain impacts. Further more, the functions and values of the floodplain to be impacted by the sewer line installation may include the loss and/or alteration of floodplain habitat, including overstory and understory vegetation, reducing vegetative water up take capabilities. There is a potential for sediment runoff during construction activities; however, erosion control and stormwater best management practices will be utilized

HUD has considered the following alterna-tives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial

1.) Avoidance and Alternatives: The proj-ect utilizes as much upland area as possi-ble. The sanitary sewer main line passes through the southwestern corner of the through the southwestern corner of the proposed project site within the 100-year floodplain of French Creek. As such, con-necting the sanitary sewer line of the pro-posed activity to the main line will require impact to the floodplain. A potential alter-native to the proposed design to minimize but not completely negate floodplain im-pact, would require sewer line expansion along South Hausman Road. According to the San Antonio Water System, this alter-native would be even more problematic despite the minimization of floodplain im-pact, due to the potential implications of pact, due to the potential implications of bypass pumping over the Edwards Aqui-fer Recharge Zone. The proposed activity utilizes a site that has zoning potential for multi-family development; has good ac-cess; and provides adequate buildable area with minimal impacts to the flood-plain. If the proposed activity does not re-ceive HUD funding assistance, the site would premain as is, no new construction would begin and no impacts to floodplain areas would occur at the subject property. The no action alternative would not ach-ieve any of the benefits attributed to the proposed activities. It would not satisfy the current need for residential housing in this area. 2.) Mitigation and Minimization: Due to the minimal size (0.18-acres) of tempora-ry impact to the SFHA in relation to the overall floodplain in the vicinity of the subject property, the potential loss of functions and values of the floodplain at the subject property are not expected to impact long-term function of the flood-plain within the analysis area. By disallowing impervious surfaces and improvements in and around the flood-plain, aside from 476-feet of sanitary sew-er line, the construction will have minimal effects on water resources. Furthermore, construction activities will comply with applicable local and state erosion and sediment control plan requirements, in-cluding the placement of silt fencing along the perimeter of the limits of con-struction. In addition, a permit application was submitted to the U.S. Army Corps of the proposed sewer line within French Creek and its unnamed tributary. Approval of qualification for NWP 58 was received from the USACE on April 26, 2022.

creases, Vilsack said. That will be driven by "the combination of the supply chain being smoothed out from the pandemic and the ability of funding from this program to begin to expand capacity."

Vilsack plans to focus on moving U.S. food supplies away from the dominance of a few highly concentrated businesses while addressing climate change challenges in a new "framework" for strengthening supply chains.

He announced initiatives including \$600 million in assistance for independently owned supplychain infrastructure such as cold storage and refrigerated trucks. That aid will come on top of funding Biden announced earlier this year to help independent processors expand in the highly concentrated meatpacking industry.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture also announced \$400 million to create regional food business centers to support small- and mid-sized farms and food processors, \$300 million to assist farms transitioning to organic production and a \$155 million increase for a program to promote healthy options in "food deserts" in low-income areas underserved by grocery stores.

The funding is from the

\$1.9 trillion stimulus package President Joe Biden signed into law in 2021. The department will provide \$375 million for organic and urban agriculture, \$900 million to expand food-processing capacity, \$550 million for local food distribution programs and food waste reduction, and \$370 million to expand access to healthy food.

Vilsack said that the \$2.1 billion alone would not be enough to create lasting change in the food system. Congress, he said, should build upon the investments in the 2023 farm bill, which sets agriculture and food policy and is typically renewed every five years.
