Opponent Mayor Josh Schroeder reported about 100 con-tributions totaling \$56,850, and expenditures of \$20,932.52 in

his April 6 report.

Campaign financial reports were due April 6 and are made public for city candidates. Mr. Dade told the Sun his reports were turned in late because of delays caused by the Passover holiday at the beginning of the month.
