Re: Water Rights No Longer Suspended in the San Saba River Watershed of the Colorado

River Basin

Dear Water Right Holder:

By letter dated August 8, 2011, you were notified that certain non-municipal diversions with priority dates of 1900 or later had been suspended due to multiple priority calls on surface water from domestic and livestock water users in the San Saba River watershed.

In response to improved conditions in the San Saba River watershed, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) is no longer enforcing the priority calls, and your water right is no longer suspended. You may resume diversion and impoundment according to the terms and conditions of your water right.

The TCEQ continues to monitor the situation closely and strives to balance protection of senior and superior surface water rights while attempting to minimize the impact to junior water right holders, within TCEQ's authority. Please note that should another priority call be made or should drought conditions persist or worsen, suspensions of junior water rights may again be necessary.

In recognition of the severity of the drought, all water right holders should continue to take actions necessary to conserve water and require your customers, if any, to do the same. You can find drought information, conservation tips, and other helpful information at the TCEQ drought page at: http://www.tceq.texas.gov/response/drought.

If you are a municipal water right holder, to help avoid the potential need for future suspensions and to ensure there is enough water for public safety needs, we recommend that you continue to implement your drought contingency plan (DCP).

In accordance with your DCP, you are required to notify TCEQ when there are changes in your drought response stages. You can notify us by using the online form available on the TCEQ drought page referenced above.
